1.1 Bushfire update - Support for Victorian area around Whittlesea

As members on e-mail know, Revd Rod James was able to travel to Whittlesea and help with the ministry support for the community and area. After preliminary comments, Rod provided the following report on 12th February 2009.

I arrived in the Whittlesea area on Monday 9th, and am staying with Malcolm and Margaret McMillan at Arthurs Creek. The Presbytery has arranged for an interim minister to come to Whittlesea for the next 5 weeks until their new minister arrives in March. This interim minister is Rev. David Howie who is just back from a year in Zambia working with Fiona Dixon-Thompson from Port Lincoln. On Wednesday leaders met at the UC at Whittlesea. At the meeting it was agreed that David Howie will work in the Whittlesea/ Kinglake communities and I will work in the Arthurs Creek/Strathewen area. These are two separate areas of the one fire zone and have relief centres at Whittlesea and Arthurs Creek respectively. Whittlesea and Arthurs Creek have not been burnt but are adjacent to the fire areas of Kinglake and Strathewen.

I am based in Arthurs Creek and working out of the Fire Station and the local hall which has been set up as a relief centre. Yesterday I was able to join a CFA vehicle and enter the fire area which is a restricted zone with police road blocks. The devastation is almost absolute in the 'hot fire' area. Almost all buildings have been destroyed, many animals killed, and many of the tall trees destroyed because the ground at their base has burned in the heat. Reports are that 30 to 35 people have lost their lives in Strathewen out of a population of about 200. Many of the properties are no-go areas as police investigation continues. On Tuesday night a public meeting was held at the Arthurs Creek hall and 500 people came. Information was given from police, Department of Human Services and local government about relief assistance, etc. It seems there are two categories of fire victims:

- those whose houses were not destroyed who have remained or returned to the fire area and are living without power and other facilities. We visited many of these people yesterday and relief supplies and human support is being brought into them.
- those whose houses were destroyed who have had to leave the area and are scattered about in temporary accommodation. These people have the greater needs, having lost not only home and property, but also neighbours and in some cases family. These people will be harder to bring assistance to and many will need personal support and counselling.

I have been registered with the CFA as a Personal Support person to operate in the Arthurs Creek/Strathewen area, and am developing a good working relationship with the local people and the CFA folk operating out of Arthurs Creek. They have a magnificent community spirit but need lots of encouragement, and some of the firefighting volunteers have seen things that will take a lot of coping with. Each day the response agenda changes and develops, and will unfold over quite a long period of time.

Many folk with whom I have contact have asked if there is a means by which they can make donations specific to the Whittlesea/Arthur's Creek relief work and to those in the Kinglake/Strathewen.

At this time gifts of money are more practical than goods, of which much has already been donated. I therefore offer the following ways of contributing to the relief work:

- 1. General donations to bushfire relief in Victoria can be made

BOOK REVIEWS

The Theology of John Wesley, Holy Love and the Shape of Grace: Paul Langkamp, ACC member in South Korea reviews Kenneth Collins new book *The Theology of John Wesley, Holy Love and the Shape of Grace*. Collins is a long-time professor of Wesley's theology at Asbury Theological Seminary in Kentucky, USA. Paul says "It's wonderful title proclaims what it is: a scholarly work about John Wesley's sermons and commentaries and other material that lays out the two great Christian themes weaving their way through all Christian thought."
