

NOTE REGARDING THE ANNUAL ACC NATIONAL COUNCIL

Meeting held in Newtown (and zoom)



14 - 16 March 2021. More information and decisions will be shared in the coming weeks following wider counsel and further discernment of the way ahead for the ACC. Your prayers for wisdom are appreciated at this new stage in the life of the ACC. The next full council meeting will be held on May 3.

Each National Council meeting (approximately every 6 weeks) is grounded in prayer and reflection led by a council member. The ACC Deputy-Chair Matt Kang spoke at a recent online ACC Council meeting affirming the centrality of the Gospel from I Corinthians 15: I-II from six key observations.

- 1) v1 the Gospel is to be preached
- 2) v3 the Gospel is a matter of first importance
- 3) v4 the Gospel is the fulfilment of Scripture
- 4) **v5** the Gospel is confirmed by eye-witnesses (Jesus physically appeared to people! There were eye-witnesses! Christianity is grounded in history, not in hearsay!)
- 5) v9 the Gospel produces deep humility
- 6) v10 Gospel ministry is God's grace at work through us

BEYOND THE REEF with Peer Bentley

Back in 1988, two 'wild-eyed' and optimistic Christian doctors Michele and Michael Browne, with their two very young children, went to serve on Aitutaki in the southern group Cook Islands for two years through Australian Volunteers Abroad. It was a job-share arrangement at the tiny local hospital, and, along with the elderly local doctor (who kept trying to retire), they provided all medical care on the island. Fortunately, their families saved their letters home (yes, paper letters, a long time before the social media era) and these sparked excellent memory recall, especially of amusing incidents that they encountered. All this enabled Michele, also a regular ACCatalyst writer and valiant 'letter to the editor' contributor to UCA publications, to pen this stimulating and insightful memoir of a time that is indeed now a lifetime away. The title itself comes from her comment in a letter home: "Sometimes it seems as if life 'beyond the reef' is happening on another planet!"


This very readable book is written in short chapters centred around a theme, a topic or an incident. They are written as tales and the setting is like 'tales from the south seas,' though in this case they are not about chests of jewels and pirate ships, but the treasures of people met, faith challenged and experience gained. The tales illustrate a wonderful love and

resonance with the local people as they explore the different cultural understandings and local experiences that they encountered. From the beginning with the interview process, to packing the car (and shipping it – a wonderful practical example of how to pack and travel), leaving family and friends, and briefings, to arriving at the hospital and understanding what the distinct lack of medical equipment would really mean – I have no doubt that this form of 'training' provided the equivalent of many years of post-graduate education in an Australian setting.

There are stories that vividly illustrate the way they were able to cope with minimal medical technology and obtain necessary supplies; and Mike even found time to preach, while juggling cross-nation arrangements to enable an emergency medical evacuation! Chapters abound with amusing vignettes about local people and customs, visitors, holiday excursions, and frequent cultural misunderstandings that illustrate just how much we all have in common. And for all of us who are linguistically and medicalise challenged, there are two very helpful glossaries: one of Maori words and another of Medical and Other Terms.

The most poignant personal reflection is to be found in 'Final Days', and it is worth obtaining the whole volume just to read this one chapter that illustrates their Christian faith in the context of the medical issues that they constantly faced.

I commend this book for its whimsical and gentle encouraging Christian message of service and love. In this time of wider world chaos and anxiety, it will help people to reflect on our neighbours, Australia, and our place in God's world.

TO KNOW CHRIST AND MAKE HIM KNOWN with Jan Weeks

"A cord of three strands is not quickly broken."

Ecclesiastes 4:12

The Bible tells us we were created for relationships – relationship with God, and relationship with others. This is true not only for us as individuals, but also for Congregations – we are part of the wider Church, and as such we are meant to be connected in fellowship with other Congregations.

Our denomination is meant to provide those bonds of fellowship for the support and encouragement of ministry and mission, and for the mutual building up of Congregations in faith and life. But what happens when those bonds of fellowship are broken?

The Belrose Congregation in Sydney has had a long history of evangelical Bible teaching ministry. Over the years of trending theological liberalism and doctrinal diversity within the UCA, the Congregation had made strong Biblical statements about the nature of the Gospel, and sexuality and ministry. Prior to the arrival of the Rev'd Ian Weeks as its Minister in 2011, the Congregation decided to join the ACC. It saw this as a means by which they could maintain the bonds of fellowship with other like-minded Congregations in the denomination and seek to continue its identification as a Congregation submitting to the authority of God's Word, adhering to the Basis of Union of the UCA.

Through its membership of the ACC, the Belrose Congregation feels it can share in the wider Church through those bonds of fellowship, and hopefully be a source of encouragement to other ACC Congregations – sharing the burdens of ministry in a broken world and in a broken denomination.

It joins with other ACC Congregations in Confessing the Lord Jesus Christ, Proclaiming the Truth, and seeking to Renew the Church.

How are we supporting the ACC?

The Congregation supports the ACC in several ways.

It has encouraged the Rev Ian Weeks, and "released" him, **to serve** on the various committees of the ACC (at times chairing the NSW Network), and on the National Council (he is currently the ACC National Treasurer).



The Congregation has hosted some ACC NSW **events**, and encourages its members to attend other ACC gatherings.

The Congregation regularly **prays** for the ACC and its leadership.

The Congregation sets aside one month per year to support the ACC **financially** through its Mission of the Month project, whereby Congregation members are encouraged to give over and above their weekly offering to that month's mission project. This is in addition to its annual ACC membership.

Are these some things your Congregation could do?

Now more than ever we need those bonds of fellowship with like-minded Congregations. It can sometimes feel a bit lonely as a Bible based, Gospel focussed Congregation within the UCA. Praise God there is the ACC that enables us to have that fellowship with, and encouragement from, other Congregations in the UCA


ACC PRAYER DISCERNMENT 2021 of Ame Hibbard ACC Prayer Network Coordinator
